

At no time did we feel threatened, although locals did advise tourists not to linger for too long



Manager Cliff Makofane has run the tavern since 2006, and says crime is not such a big problem here as it is more prevalent along the main Hazyview-White River road. All liquor outlets have to ensure that their licenses are in order, as police regularly do inspections and confiscate stock should there are any irregularities. Establishments do not pay rent as such, but give R1 000 per year to the local chief, who then provides a letter of occupation.



Mthobisi runs the gym in honour of his mother Thandeka, who founded it over a decade ago – a first for Masoyi Settlement. Rates are R20 per hour or R250 for a month's subscription. The gym is more popular in summer and mostly frequented by male patrons, says Mthobisi. Crime has hit him hard in the past, with electronic and exercise equipment being stolen.



Manager Jabu Ndlala provides a range of services including tyre and rim repairs. The balancing of two wheels costs R70.

There are many more businesses available along the route, ranging from shoe repairs to Internet cafes.



Khayelihle's Kitchen is run by Cyrel Ntandane, and is open from 08:00 to 20:00. A full chicken will set one back R70, while a "kota" costs R20. Cyrel's biggest concern is arranging a sign for his temporary establishment, a service often provided by Coca-Cola.
